1	<b>Little Tinamou</b>	<i>Crypturellus soui</i>	Heard only at Rio Claro
2	<b>Pied-billed Grebe</b>	<i>Podilymbus podiceps</i>	Best was 2 with chicks at Parca Florida in Bogota
3	<b>Brown Pelican</b>	<i>Pelecanus occidentalis</i>	Up to 30 seen along the coast near Los Flamencos reserve
4	<b>Neotropic Cormorant</b>	<i>Phalacrocorax brasilianus</i>	Seen on 8 days with max of 500+ along coast around Los Flamencos Reserve
5	<b>Magnificent Frigatebird</b>	<i>Fregata magnificens</i>	Along the coast off Santa Marta with 8 seen while having lunch on the beach one day
6	<b>Great Blue Heron</b>	<i>Ardea herodias</i>	A few seen along the coast especially Isle de Salamanca
7	<b>Cocoi Heron</b>	<i>Ardea cocoi</i>	Up to 4 at Laguna de Sonso and 2 at Isle de Salamanca
8	<b>Great Egret</b>	<i>Ardea alba</i>	Seen on 11 days with many on coast
9	<b>Snowy Egret</b>	<i>Egretta thula</i>	Seen on 5 days with most along coast
10	<b>Little Blue Heron</b>	<i>Egretta caerulea</i>	Seen at Laguna de Sonso and Isle de Salamanca
11	<b>Reddish Egret</b>	<i>Egretta rufescens</i>	Good numbers at Los Flamencos Reserve
12	<b>Tricoloured Heron</b>	<i>Egretta tricolor</i>	Max 3 at Los Flamencos Reserve
13	<b>Striated Heron</b>	<i>Butorides striata</i>	Seen on 7 days with max 4 at Laguna de Sonso
14	<b>Cattle Egret</b>	<i>Bubulcus ibis</i>	Seen on 14 days and common in many areas
15	<b>Black-crowned Night-Heron</b>	<i>Nycticorax nycticorax</i>	Just a few seen
16	<b>Least Bittern</b>	<i>Ixobrychus exilis bogotensis</i>	One female seen very well at our Aplolinar's Wren site. This bird was of the very localised <i>bogotensis</i> race
17	<b>Pinnated Bittern</b>	<i>Botaurus pinnatus</i>	Excellent views in the reeds and in flight at Laguna Sonso.
18	<b>Bare-faced Ibis</b>	<i>Phimosus infuscatus</i>	Seen on 6 days with max of 50 on and near Laguna Sonso
19	<b>White Ibis</b>	<i>Eudocimus albus</i>	Just 2 seen at Los Flamencos Reserve
20	<b>Wood Stork</b>	<i>Mycteria Americana</i>	2 at Los Flamencos Reserve
21	<b>Roseate Spoonbill</b>	<i>Platalea ajaja</i>	Max 20 at Los Flamencos Reserve
22	<b>Black-bellied Whistling-Duck</b>	<i>Dendrocygna autumnalis</i>	Seen on 2 days with 20 at Laguna de Sonso
23	<b>Muscovy Duck</b>	<i>Cairina moschata</i>	1 seen perched up at Isle de Salamanca
24	<b>Torrent Duck</b>	<i>Merganetta armata</i>	A pair were seen well on the river before we reached La Suiza
25	<b>Andean Teal</b>	<i>Anas andinus</i>	2 seen on a lake in the high Paramo
26	<b>Merida Speckled Teal</b>	<i>Anas altipetens</i>	We saw 6 of these very localised birds at our Bogota Rail site, apparently a reliable place.
27	<b>Blue-winged Teal</b>	<i>Anas discors</i>	Maximum of 40 at Bogota Rail site
28	<b>Cinnamon Teal</b>	<i>Anas cyanoptera</i>	4 on river at Laguna de Sonso
29	<b>Masked Duck</b>	<i>Nomonyx dominica</i>	1 female seen well at Parca Florida, Bogota
30	<b>Andean Duck</b>	<i>Oxyura ferruginea</i>	Seen on 3 days with max 10 at Bogota Rail site
31	<b>Turkey Vulture</b>	<i>Cathartes aura</i>	Common and seen on 13 days
32	<b>Lesser Yellow-headed Vulture</b>	<i>Cathartes burrovianus</i>	Good views of one bird

33	<b>Black Vulture</b>	<i>Coragyps atratus</i>	Seen on all 19 days of the tour - common
34	<b>King Vulture</b>	<i>Sarcoramphus papa</i>	2 seen near Rio Claro and one other Targanga
35	<b>Osprey</b>	<i>Pandion haliaetus</i>	Seen on 5 days, 2 on coast
36	<b>Hook-billed Kite</b>	<i>Chondrohierax uncinatus</i>	One circled through a flock of Yellow-eared Parrots at El Jardin and another in the dry scrub near the coast
37	<b>Swallow-tailed Kite</b>	<i>Elanoides forficatus</i>	The best was 25 from the Gala[agos Road
38	<b>Pearl Kite</b>	<i>Gampsonyx swainsonii</i>	Seen on 3 days with nice views in coastal scrub
39	<b>White-tailed Kite</b>	<i>Elanus leucurus</i>	Seen on 6 days with max of 4 on one day
40	<b>Snail Kite</b>	<i>Rostrhamus sociabilis</i>	Just two seen at Laguna Sonso
41	<b>Plumbeous Kite</b>	<i>Ictinia plumbea</i>	Only one seen during entire trip
42	<b>Plain-breasted Hawk</b>	<i>Accipiter ventralis</i>	Seen on two days
43	<b>Common Black-Hawk</b>	<i>Buteogallus anthracinus</i>	One seen well in the dry Savanna
44	<b>Great Black-Hawk</b>	<i>Buteogallus urubitinga</i>	One also seen in the dry Savanna
45	<b>Savanna Hawk</b>	<i>Buteogallus meridionalis</i>	2 seen well as we left Victoria and one flying past at Isle de Salamanca
46	<b>Harris's Hawk</b>	<i>Parabuteo unicinctus</i>	Two were seen on the coast
47	<b>Gray Hawk</b>	<i>Buteo nitidus</i>	Very nice views of a perched bird at Rio Claro
48	<b>Roadside Hawk</b>	<i>Buteo magnirostris</i>	Regularly seen on 10 days at various sites
49	<b>Short-tailed Hawk</b>	<i>Buteo brachyurus</i>	Two were seen
50	<b>Broad-winged Hawk</b>	<i>Buteo platypterus</i>	Seen on 7 days
51	<b>White-tailed Hawk</b>	<i>Buteo albicaudatus</i>	Two seen - one scoped flying at Laguna Sonso
52	<b>Swainson's Hawk</b>	<i>Buteo swainsoni</i>	4 were seen flying near La Suiza
53	<b>Zone-tailed Hawk</b>	<i>Buteo albonotatus</i>	One seen on our journey up to Santa Marta
54	<b>Black-and-chestnut Eagle</b>	<i>Spizaetus isidori</i>	An immature bird flew past and landed allowing close views in the Santa marta mountains
55	<b>Northern Caracara</b>	<i>Caracara cheriway</i>	Seen on 7 days with 20+ on the coast
56	<b>Yellow-headed Caracara</b>	<i>Milvago chimachima</i>	Seen on 8 days with 6 at Laguna Sonso
57	<b>Collared Forest Falcon</b>	<i>Micrastur semitorquatus</i>	Just a few people saw a close perched bird that Basy found and got good photos of
58	<b>American Kestrel</b>	<i>Falco sparverius</i>	Seen on 5 days
59	<b>Merlin</b>	<i>Falco columbarius</i>	Sen on 2 days one very well at Apolinar's site
60	<b>Bat Falcon</b>	<i>Falco ruficularis</i>	Seen on days , a nice one perched Santa Marta
61	<b>Aplomado Falcon</b>	<i>Falco femorales</i>	One on the way to Jardin and one on the coast
62	<b>Peregrine Falcon</b>	<i>Falco peregrinus</i>	One seen at Bogota on last day
63	<b>Chestnut-winged Chachalaca E</b>	<i>Ortalis garrula</i>	<b>Endemic:</b> Excellent views of 3 perched on cactus plants on the coast at Isle de Salamanca
64	<b>Band-tailed Guan</b>	<i>Penelope argyrotis</i>	One seen at our highest point on Santa Marta
65	<b>Andean Guan</b>	<i>Penelope montagnii</i>	One seen feeding on top of small tree in hills above Bogota
66	<b>Cauca Guan E</b>	<i>Penelope perspicax</i>	<b>Endemic:</b> Up to 10 seen along the road at Otun Quimbaya. An endangered species declining due to loss of specific habitat requirements
67	<b>Wattled Guan</b>	<i>Aburria aburri</i>	A surprise find when John G, drew our attention to a lone bird in the tree tops where we had just been watching Cauca Guans
68	<b>Sickle-winged Guan</b>	<i>Chamaepetes goudotii</i>	Singles sen on 3 days including Galapagos Road, Rio Blanco and Santa Marta
69	<b>Black-fronted Wood-Quail</b>	<i>Odontophorus atrifrons</i>	With three very small disjunct populations . 2 in Colombia and 1 in Venezuela, we enjoyed superb views of 5 birds of the nominate race in the gardens of Eldora Lodge, Santa Marta

70	<b>Chestnut Wood-Quail E</b>	<i>Odontophorus hyperythrus</i>	<b>Endemic:</b> Heard only at Manizalis and the Otun Quimbaya reserve where on both occasions each calling group were inaccessible to us
71	<b>Limpkin</b>	<i>Aramus guarauna</i>	4 seen at Laguna Sonso
72	<b>Bogota Rail E</b>	<i>Rallus semiplumbeus</i>	<b>Endemic:</b> Most visitors try and see this species in the park in Bogota! A far more reliable site such as the one we visited allowed us fantastic views of up to 10 birds, most out in the open
73	<b>Purple Gallinule</b>	<i>Porphyrio martinica</i>	6 seen at Laguna Sonso
74	<b>Spot-flanked Gallinule</b>	<i>Gallinula melanops</i>	Seen on 2 days with 12 being seen on wetlands on our first day
75	<b>Common Moorhen</b>	<i>Gallinula chloropus</i>	Seen on 4 days with max 20 at park in Bogota
76	<b>American Coot</b>	<i>Fulica americana</i>	Seen on 3 days with max 30 in park in Bogota
77	<b>Black-bellied Plover</b>	<i>Pluvialis squatarola</i>	30+ seen along the coast
78	<b>Semipalmated Plover</b>	<i>Charadrius semipalmatus</i>	Up to 50 seen along the coast
79	<b>Wilson's Plover</b>	<i>Charadrius wilsonia</i>	8 seen in lagoon at Isle de Salamanca
80	<b>Southern Lapwing</b>	<i>Vanellus chilensis</i>	Seen on 11 days but most impressive was 180 seen in one field
81	<b>Andean Lapwing</b>	<i>Vanellus resplendens</i>	A rare bird for Colombia we found two on the high Paramo at Los Navados N.P
82	<b>Wattled Jacana</b>	<i>Jacana jacana</i>	Seen on 6 days with highest count 10. Note that birds were of the black race <i>hypomelaena</i>
83	<b>Black-necked Stilt</b>	<i>Himantopus mexicanus</i>	Seen on 2 days with 200 at Isle de Salamanca
84	<b>Noble Snipe</b>	<i>Gallinago nobilis</i>	2 seen close in flight at our Bogota Rail site and one walking around at park in Bogota
85	<b>Greater Yellowlegs</b>	<i>Tringa melanoleuca</i>	Seen on 3 days with good numbers along coast
86	<b>Lesser Yellowlegs</b>	<i>Tringa flavipes</i>	Seen on 3 days with good numbers along coast
87	<b>Spotted Sandpiper</b>	<i>Actitis macularius</i>	Seen on 7 days with most along coast
88	<b>Solitary Sandpiper</b>	<i>Tringa solitaria</i>	Seen on 5 days with max 3 at Laguna Sonso
89	<b>Short-billed Dowitcher</b>	<i>Limnodromus griseus</i>	Just 2 seen in lagoon at Isle de Salamanca
90	<b>Willet</b>	<i>Tringa semipalmata</i>	Several seen along coast
91	<b>Least Sandpiper</b>	<i>Calidris minutilla</i>	Mostly along coast, also 2 at Laguna Sonso
92	<b>Semipalmated Sandpiper</b>	<i>Calidris pusilla</i>	Up to 100 mostly at Isle de Salamanca
93	<b>Western Sandpiper</b>	<i>Calidris mauri</i>	8 found amongst the masses of Semipalmated's
94	<b>Whimbrel</b>	<i>Numenius phaeopus</i>	Seen on 2 days with max of 4 on coast
95	<b>Ruddy Turnstone</b>	<i>Arenaria interpres</i>	Just 2 individuals seen along the coast
96	<b>Lesser Black-backed Gull</b>	<i>Larus fuscus graellsii</i>	1 seen flying off from gull and tern roost at Los Flamencos on the coast
97	<b>Laughing Gull</b>	<i>Leucophaeus atricilla</i>	Seen on 2 days along coast inc Los Flamencos
98	<b>Caspian Tern</b>	<i>Hydroprogne caspia</i>	10 seen at roost site at Los Flamencos
99	<b>Royal Tern</b>	<i>Thalasseus maximus</i>	Up to 50 seen on coast and Los Flamencos
100	<b>Sandwich Tern</b>	<i>Thalasseus sandvicensis</i>	Up to 80 at roost site at Los Flamencos
101	<b>Forster's Tern</b>	<i>Sterna forsteri</i>	One was found amongst terns at roost site at Los Flamencos, this represents not only the first record for Colombia but also the first record for the whole of South America! A good find !
102	<b>Rock Pigeon</b>	<i>Columba livia</i>	Seen on 10 days
103	<b>Band-tailed Pigeon</b>	<i>Patagioenas fasciata</i>	Seen on 2 days - best views on Galapagos Rd
104	<b>Bare-eyed Pigeon</b>	<i>Patagioenas corensis</i>	Seen on coast on 2 days. Best Isle de Salamanca
105	<b>Pale-vented Pigeon</b>	<i>Patagioenas cayennensis</i>	Seen on 4 days with max 80 at Laguna Sonso
106	<b>Eared Dove</b>	<i>Zenaida auriculata</i>	Common and seen on 12 days
107	<b>Common Ground-Dove</b>	<i>Columbina passerina</i>	Seen on 3 days with most on coast

108	<b>Ruddy Ground-Dove</b>	<i>Columbina talpacoti</i>	Seen at various sites on 7 days
109	<b>Scaled Dove</b>	<i>Columbina squammata</i>	Seen 2 days on coast
110	<b>White-tipped Dove</b>	<i>Leptotila verreauxi</i>	Seen on 4 days
111	<b>Ruddy Quail-Dove</b>	<i>Geotrygon montana</i>	A single bird seen in forest at Victoria
112	<b>Lined Quail-Dove</b>	<i>Geotrygon linearis</i>	Singles on 2 days in Santa Marta mountains
113	<b>Scarlet-fronted Parakeet</b>	<i>Aratinga wagleri</i>	8 noisy birds seen from garden near Cali
114	<b>Brown-throated Parakeet</b>	<i>Aratinga pertinax</i>	Up to 40 seen on one day along the coast
115	<b>Golden-plumed Parakeet</b>	<i>Leptosittaca branickii</i>	Several heard flying and 2 seen perched in tree top at Otun Quimbaya reserve
116	<b>Yellow-eared Parrot</b>	<i>Ognorhynchus icterotis</i>	A critically endangered species that is very rare and local. We saw a couple of groups in flight and 8 birds feeding in some low fruiting trees
117	<b>Santa Marta Parakeet E</b>	<i>Pyrrhura viridicata</i>	<b>Endemic:</b> an excellent bird to see as most companies miss this one! We had stunning views of 49 birds which included close fly pasts and several birds showing well in the tree tops
118	<b>Green-rumped Parrotlet</b>	<i>Forpus passerinus</i>	Excellent views of up to 10 on the coast
119	<b>Spectacled Parrotlet</b>	<i>Forpus conspicillatus</i>	Max of 10 seen on 6 days at various sites
120	<b>Orange-chinned Parakeet</b>	<i>Brotogeris jugularis</i>	Up to 10 in the Rio Claro area
121	<b>Blue-headed Parrot</b>	<i>Pionus menstruus</i>	Seen on 5 days at various sites with max of 12
122	<b>Red-billed Parrot</b>	<i>Pionus sordidus</i>	8 seen on way up to Santa Marta mountains
123	<b>White-capped Parrot</b>	<i>Pionus seniloides</i>	A couple flew over calling at Jardin
124	<b>Bronze-winged Parrot</b>	<i>Pionus chalcopterus</i>	Small groups seen on 5 separate days
125	<b>Scaly-naped Amazon</b>	<i>Amazona mercenaria</i>	2 were seen at high altitude in Santa Marta
126	<b>Mealy Amazon</b>	<i>Amazona farinosa</i>	12 were seen on just one day during tour
127	<b>Little Cuckoo</b>	<i>Coccyua minuta</i>	Brief views of one bird as we left La Vega Park
128	<b>Dwarf Cuckoo</b>	<i>Coccyua pumila</i>	A stunning bird, Bart found one which we all saw perched in a bare tree at Laguna Sonso
129	<b>Squirrel Cuckoo</b>	<i>Piaya cayana</i>	Seen on 5 days
130	<b>Striped Cuckoo</b>	<i>Tapera</i>	Just one heard calling at Victoria
131	<b>Greater Ani</b>	<i>Crotophaga major</i>	2 were seen at Laguna Sonso
132	<b>Smooth-billed Ani</b>	<i>Crotophaga ani</i>	Common and seen many times on 12 days
133	<b>Mottled Owl</b>	<i>Ciccaba virgata</i>	Fantastic close views of a bird spotlighted at night in the Santa Marta mountains
134	<b>Stygian Owl</b>	<i>Asio stygius</i>	An excellent find we had superb views of a bird seen during the daytime at Laguna Sonso
135	<b>Santa Marta Screech-Owl E</b>	<i>Megascops gilesi</i>	<b>Endemic:</b> We heard birds calling on two separate nights but could not see them. Maybe due to close proximity of a Mottled Owl which it seems can predate this species
136	<b>Oilbird</b>	<i>Steatornis caripensis</i>	We visited a fantastic cave which held 20 plus birds in the Rio Claro area
137	<b>Common Potoo</b>	<i>Nyctibius griseus</i>	Nice views of a bird in the open on a daytime roost, amazingly in same tree as Stygian Owl and Common Nighthawk at Laguna Sonso
138	<b>Rufous-bellied Nighthawk</b>	<i>Lurocalis rufiventris</i>	One flew over at dusk at Rio Blanco
139	<b>Common Nighthawk</b>	<i>Chordeiles minor</i>	One on daytime roost at Laguna Sonso
140	<b>Lesser Nighthawk</b>	<i>Chordeiles acutipennis</i>	At least 2 seen during the day on roosts along the coast
141	<b>Pauraque</b>	<i>Nyctidromus albicollis</i>	Several heard and one spotlighted at Rio Claro
142	<b>White-tailed Nightjar</b>	<i>Caprimulgus cayennensis</i>	One seen very well on the ground amongst leaf litter on the coast
143	<b>White-collared Swift</b>	<i>Streptoprocne zonaris</i>	Seen on 4 days with biggest flock of 80 Jardin

144	<b>Gray-rumped Swift</b>	<i>Chaetura cinereiventris</i>	10 at Galapagos Rd and a couple at Rio Claro
145	<b>Green Hermit</b>	<i>Phaethornis guy</i>	2 seen at Galapagos Rd and nearby on 2 days
146	<b>Tawny-bellied Hermit</b>	<i>Phaethornis syrmatorphorus</i>	Just one briefly at the Rio Blanco reserve
147	<b>Western Long-billed Hermit</b>	<i>Phaethornis longirostris</i>	Four seen on one day around Rio Claro
148	<b>Stripe-throated Hermit</b>	<i>Phaethornis striigularis</i>	One seen at Rio Claro and another seen on the day we left the Santa Marta highlands
149	<b>Sooty-capped Hermit</b>	<i>Phaethornis augusti</i>	Just one seen by a few of us as we birded our way up the Santa Marta mountains
150	<b>Green-fronted Lancebill</b>	<i>Doryfera ludovicae</i>	3 were seen on the Galapagos Road
151	<b>White-necked Jacobin</b>	<i>Florisuga mellivora</i>	Seen on 2 days with most 10 at private house with hummingbird feeders
152	<b>Brown Violetear</b>	<i>Colibri delphinae</i>	4 seen on feeders at private house
153	<b>Green Violet-ear</b>	<i>Colibri thalassinus</i>	A few seen on 9 days throughout the tour
154	<b>Sparkling Violetear</b>	<i>Colibri coruscans</i>	A few seen on 7 days throughout the tour
155	<b>Black-throated Mango</b>	<i>Anthracothorax nigricollis</i>	Seen on 6 days with max of 6 at Jardin
156	<b>Red-billed Emerald</b>	<i>Chlorostilbon gibsoni</i>	A near endemic we saw up to 4 along the coast
157	<b>Violet-crowned Woodnymph</b>	<i>Thalurania colombica</i>	Seen on 4 days with most in Santa Marta
158	<b>Buffy Hummingbird</b>	<i>Leucippus fallax</i>	A very localised species we saw 4 very well on the coast – note these were subspecies <i>cervina</i>
159	<b>Blue-chested Hummingbird</b>	<i>Amazilia amabilis</i>	A single bird seen very close sat on a nest beside our lodge at Rio Claro
160	<b>Andean Emerald</b>	<i>Amazilia franciae</i>	10 or more seen on feeders at private house
161	<b>Steely-vented Hummingbird</b>	<i>Amazilia saucerrottei</i>	Seen on 2 days with up to 20 seen on feeders at private house
162	<b>Rufous-tailed Hummingbird</b>	<i>Amazilia tzacatl</i>	Seen on 7 days throughout tour
163	<b>Blossomcrown E</b>	<i>Anthocephala floriceps</i>	<b>Endemic:</b> This much wanted hummer performed well for us on 2 days feeders on roadside flowers in the Santa Marta mountains
164	<b>White-vented Plumeleteer</b>	<i>Chalybura buffonii</i>	Seen on 2 days with max 4 at a site near Cali
165	<b>Speckled Hummingbird</b>	<i>Adelomyia melanogenys</i>	Seen on 4 days and common at Rio Blanco
166	<b>Fawn-breasted Brilliant</b>	<i>Heliodoxa rubinoides</i>	Seen on 4 days with max 6 at Rio Blanco
167	<b>White-tailed Hillstar</b>	<i>Urochroa bougueri</i>	2 seen wellperched and feeding on flowers along the Galapagos Road
168	<b>Mountain Velvetbreast</b>	<i>Lafresnaya lafresnayi</i>	Only one bird seen throughout entire tour
169	<b>Bronzy Inca</b>	<i>Coeligena coeligena</i>	Singles sen on 3 ays with good views of one on a nest just 3 ft from the ground at Galapagos Rd
170	<b>Collared Inca</b>	<i>Coeligena torquata</i>	Seen on 3 days with max 8 seen around Jardin
171	<b>White-tailed Starfrontlet E</b>	<i>Coeligena phalerata</i>	<b>Endemic:</b> Seen on 3 days in the Santa Marta mountains with superb views in lodge gardens
172	<b>Dusky Starfrontlet E</b>	<i>Coeligena orina</i>	<b>Endemic:</b> Fantastic prolonged close views of this super rare bird. Previously known from just one museum specimen, it was re-discovered in 2004. Our local guide Jose had birded this road in Jardin endlessly and had never seen this species there before. How good is that !!!
173	<b>Buff-tailed Coronet</b>	<i>Boissonneaua flavescens</i>	Seen on 2 days with max 50 at Rio Blanco
174	<b>Velvet-purple Coronet</b>	<i>Boissonneaua jardini</i>	Just one individual seen
175	<b>Tourmaline Sunangel</b>	<i>Helianthus exortis</i>	4 at Rio Blanco and 20 around Jardin
176	<b>Glowing Puffleg</b>	<i>Eriocnemis vestita</i>	Seen on 2 days in the hills above Bogota

177	<b>Black-thighed Puffleg</b>	<i>Eriocnemis derbyi</i>	An excellent find by Gina we enjoyed close views of one bird as we descended Los Nevados
178	<b>Coppery-bellied Puffleg</b>	<i>Eriocnemis cupreiventris</i>	Very local in Colombia and Venezuela we saw several on 2 days in hills above Bogota
179	<b>Golden-breasted Puffleg</b>	<i>Eriocnemis mosquera</i>	Just one seen in Los Nevados National Park

405	<b>White-capped Dipper</b>	<i>Cinclus leucocephalus</i>	Seen on 5 days with nice views at Galapagos Road and on a river towards La Suiza

506	<b>Rosy Thrush-Tanager</b>	<i>Rhodinocichla rosea</i>	Only heard once during trip at La Vega
507	<b>Yellow-backed Tanager</b>	<i>Hemithraupis flavicollis</i>	A surprise bird, one was seen in feeding flock in forest near Oilbird cave at Rio Claro
508	<b>Guira Tanager</b>	<i>Hemithraupis guira</i>	2 were seen as we were about to leave Victoria
509	<b>White-capped Tanager</b>	<i>Sericossypha albocristata</i>	One of the group favourites 4 birds performed admirably for us on the road above Jardin
510	<b>Ash-throated Bush-Tanager</b>	<i>Chlorospingus canigularis</i>	Just one bird seen well in small mixed flock at Otun Quimbaya
511	<b>Dusky-bellied Bush-Tanager</b>	<i>Chlorospingus semifuscus</i>	One bird was seen on the Galapagos Road. Note the race <i>livingstoni</i>
512	<b>Black-backed Bush-Tanager</b>	<i>Urothraupis stolzmanni</i>	Stunning prolonged close views of up to 10 birds in Los Navados National Park
513	<b>Grey-hooded Bush-Tanager</b>	<i>Cnemoscopus rubrirostris</i>	Seen on 2 days at Rio Blanco and Jardin
514	<b>Black-capped Hemispingus</b>	<i>Hemispingus atropileus</i>	Seen on 4 days with best count of 10 at Rio Blanco. Also in hills above Bogota
515	<b>Superciliaried Hemispingus</b>	<i>Hemispingus superciliaris</i>	Seen on 4 days with max 6 above Jardin and a few in hills above Bogota
516	<b>Oleaginous Hemispingus</b>	<i>Hemispingus frontalis</i>	Small flocks seen on 2 days with 8 max Jardin
517	<b>Black-eared Hemispingus</b>	<i>Hemispingus melanotis</i>	2 seen at Rio Blanco and another 2 at Jardin, also in hills above Bogota

519	<b>Grass-green Tanager</b>	<i>Chlorornis riefferii</i>	Seen on 2 days we had great views of up to 4 both at Rio Blanco and at Jardin
520	<b>Plush-capped Finch (Plushcap)</b>	<i>Catamblyrhynchus diadema</i>	This bamboo specialist showed to us on 3 days, Manizalis, Jardin and in hills above Bogota
521	<b>Blue-black Grosbeak</b>	<i>Cyanocompsa cyanooides</i>	One popped up briefly near Oilbird cave
522	<b>Slate-coloured Grosbeak</b>	<i>Saltator grossus</i>	Sometimes called Slaty Grosbeak we got excellent views of 2 feeding in a tree with mixed flock near Oilbird cave at Rio Claro
523	<b>Buff-throated Saltator</b>	<i>Saltator maximus</i>	Seen on 5 separate days
524	<b>Black-winged Saltator</b>	<i>Saltator atripennis</i>	Just 2 seen near Otun Quimbaya
525	<b>Masked Saltator</b>	<i>Saltator cinctus</i>	This rare and near threatened bird is rarely seen in Colombia but we were fortunate to get stunning views of a pair at Rio Blanco
526	<b>Greyish Saltator</b>	<i>Saltator coerulescens</i>	2 were seen at Jardin and 1 in scrub on coast
527	<b>Orinocan Saltator</b>	<i>Saltator orinocensis</i>	Really nice views of 1 in dry scrub along coast
528	<b>Streaked Saltator</b>	<i>Saltator striatipectus</i>	Seen on 3 days including Laguna Pedro Palo, Jardin and road up to Santa Marta
529	<b>Rose-breasted Grosbeak</b>	<i>Pheucticus ludovicianus</i>	Single birds seen on 3 days
530	<b>Red-capped Cardinal</b>	<i>Paroaria gularis</i>	3 birds were seen at Laguna de Sonso
531	<b>Pileated Finch</b>	<i>Coryphospingus pileatus</i>	Just one seen in dry scrub along the coast
532	<b>Tanager Finch</b>	<i>Oreothraupis arremonops</i>	What a stunner! This often skulky species showed incredibly well to us at Jardin
533	<b>Yellow-throated Brush-Finch</b>	<i>Atlappetes gutturalis</i>	Seen on 3 days we saw a couple near El Cairo and another couple on the way to Jardin
534	<b>Pale-naped Brush-Finch</b>	<i>Atlappetes pallidinucha</i>	4 birds gave superb views at Loa Navados NP and 2 more showed well in hills above Bogota
535	<b>Santa Marta Brush-Finch E</b>	<i>Atlappetes melanocephalus</i>	<b>Endemic:</b> A Santa Marta endemic we saw it on 3 days with as many as 6 on one day
536	<b>Tricoloured Brush-Finch</b>	<i>Atlappetes tricolor</i>	Up to 6 were seen along the Galapagos Road
537	<b>Moustached Brush-Finch</b>	<i>Atlappetes albofrenatus</i>	Just 2 noisy birds showed at Laguna Pedro Palo
538	<b>Slaty Brush-Finch</b>	<i>Atlappetes schistaceus</i>	6 seen at Rio Blanco and others at Jardin
539	<b>Stripe-headed Brush-Finch</b>	<i>Atlappetes torquatus</i>	2 were seen at Rio Blanco and another 2 seen as we made our way to the Santa Marta mountains
540	<b>Tocuyo Sparrow</b>	<i>Arremonops tocuensis</i>	One really tricky bird showed to a few in the dry scrub along the coast

543	<b>Black-faced Grassquit</b>	<i>Tiaris bicolor</i>	2 birds seen well in coffee country at La Mesa
544	<b>Yellow-faced Grassquit</b>	<i>Tiaris olivacea</i>	Seen on 3 days
545	<b>Band-tailed Seedeater</b>	<i>Catamenia analis</i>	6 were seen in reeds at parc in Bogota, last day
546	<b>Paramo Seedeater</b>	<i>Catamenia homochroa</i>	One bird was sat right out in the open for a few seconds and only a few people got on to it before it disappeared in the high Santa Marta
547	<b>Plain-coloured Seedeater</b>	<i>Catamenia inornata</i>	Just one seen in paramo at Los Navados NP
548	<b>Chestnut-bellied Seed-Finch</b>	<i>Oryzoborus angolensis</i>	One was seen around Rio Claro
549	<b>Lesson's Seedeater</b>	<i>Sporophila bouvronides</i>	Just one seen in dry scrub along coast
550	<b>Grey Seedeater</b>	<i>Sporophila intermedia</i>	Singles seen on 3 days

551	<b>Black-and-white Seedeater</b>	<i>Sporophila luctuosa</i>	5 were seen feeding beside road at Otun Quimbaya and another 2 on the way to Jardin
552	<b>Yellow-bellied Seedeater</b>	<i>Sporophila nigricollis</i>	Seen on 9 days with max of 20 Galapagos Rd
553	<b>Ruddy-breasted Seedeater</b>	<i>Sporophila minuta</i>	Seen on 2 days with great views on the way to Jardin at our lunch stop
554	<b>Blue-black Grassquit</b>	<i>Volatinia jacarina</i>	Widespread and seen on 7 days
555	<b>Saffron Finch</b>	<i>Sicalis flaveola</i>	Also widespread and seen on 7 days
556	<b>Plumbeous Sierra-Finch</b>	<i>Phrygilus unicolor</i>	2 were seen at Los Navados National Park
557	<b>Rufous-collared Sparrow</b>	<i>Zonotrichia capensis</i>	Common and seen on 17 days
558	<b>Andean Siskin</b>	<i>Carduelis spinescens</i>	Seen on 3 days including Santa Marta and 6 in hills above Bogota
559	<b>Yellow-bellied Siskin</b>	<i>Carduelis xanthogastra</i>	Seen on 2 days with 2 on the way to La Suiza and another at Rio Blanco
560	<b>Lesser Goldfinch</b>	<i>Carduelis psaltria</i>	Widespread and seen on 8 days
561	<b>Shiny Cowbird</b>	<i>Molothrus bonariensis</i>	Seen at several location on 8 days
562	<b>Crested Oropendola</b>	<i>Psarocolius decumanus</i>	Fairly easy to see in Santa Marta mountains
563	<b>Chestnut-headed Oropendola</b>	<i>Zarhynchus wagleri</i>	Up to 8 were seen nesting near the Oilbird cave at Rio Claro
564	<b>Russet-backed Oropendola</b>	<i>Psarocolius angustifrons</i>	Up to 6 nesting birds were seen above Jardin
565	<b>Yellow-rumped Cacique</b>	<i>Cacicus cela</i>	One bird seen near Oilbird cave at Rio Claro
566	<b>Northern Mountain Cacique</b>	<i>Cacicus leucoramphus</i>	Fabulous views of 6 birds displaying close by along the Galapagos Road
567	<b>Great-tailed Grackle</b>	<i>Quiscalus mexicanus</i>	Seen on 3 days in lowlands of Santa Marta and dry scrubby coast
568	<b>Carib grackle</b>	<i>Quiscalus lugubris</i>	Seen on a couple of days around coastal areas this bird has only recently colonized
569	<b>Red-bellied Grackle E</b>	<i>Hypopyrrhus pyrohypogaster</i>	<b>Endemic:</b> This endangered and localised species was a delight to see with 7 birds performing well above Jardin
570	<b>Yellow-hooded Blackbird</b>	<i>Agelaius icterocephalus</i>	4 birds were seen at our Apolinar's Wren site
571	<b>Orchard Oriole</b>	<i>Icterus spurius</i>	Just 3 birds seen at Laguna de Sonso
572	<b>Orange-crowned Oriole</b>	<i>Icterus auricapillus</i>	One showed well in hotel grounds at Rio Claro
573	<b>Yellow Oriole</b>	<i>Icterus nigrogularis</i>	Max of 4 were seen on 4 days
574	<b>Baltimore Oriole</b>	<i>Icterus galbula</i>	Just one bird seen at Jardin
575	<b>Yellow-backed Oriole</b>	<i>Icterus chrysater</i>	4 birds seen on one day near Laguna Pedro Palo

1	<b>Red-tailed Squirrel</b>	<i>Sciurus granatensis</i>	Variable and seen on 3 days
2	<b>Venezuelan Red Howler Monkey</b>	<i>Alouatta seniculus</i>	4 of these spectacular monkeys were seen when found by David at Otun Quimbaya
3	<b>Silvery-brown Bare-faced Tamarin</b>	<i>Saguinus leucopus</i>	One of these tiny animals were seen near Rio Claro
4	<b>Brown-eared Woolly Opossum</b>	<i>Caluromys lanatus</i>	A superb find by Gina of one asleep on a branch beside our lunch stop at Rio Claro
5	<b>Cavy</b>	<i>Cavia aperea</i>	Just one seen on our very last day
6	<b>Capybara</b>	<i>Hydrochoerus hydrochaeris</i>	One seen well before sneaking into cover at Laguna de Sonso
