8	Cocoi Heron	<i>Ardea cocoi</i>	Up to 3 seen at Isle de Salamanca
9	Great Egret	<i>Ardes alba</i>	Seen on 12 days with many along the coast
10	Snowy Egret	<i>Egretta thula</i>	Seen on 6 days with most along coast
11	Little Blue Heron	<i>Egretta caerulea</i>	Seen on 4 days including Isle de Salamanca
12	Reddish Egret	<i>Egretta rufescens</i>	1 was seen at Los flamencos
13	Tricolored Heron	<i>Egretta tricolor</i>	Max 3 at Los Flamencos Reserve
14	Green Heron	<i>Butorides virecens</i>	1 seen in wetland as we drove up Santa Marta
15	Striated Heron	<i>Butorides striata</i>	Seen on first day at Parque Florida, Bogota
16	Cattle Egret	<i>Bubulcus ibis</i>	Seen on 14 days and common in many areas
17	Capped Heron	<i>Pilherodius pileatus</i>	1 was seen in flight over fields on our way to Victoria
18	Black-crowned Night-Heron	<i>Nycticorax nycticorax</i>	Seen on 3 days with several birds at Parque Florida, Bogota

19	Yellow-crowned Night-Heron	<i>Nyctanassa violacea</i>	Seen in mangroves along coast from Guajira
20	Bare-faced Ibis	<i>Phimosus infuscatus</i>	Seen on 6 days with max of 40 in fields on the way to Ibague
21	White Ibis	<i>Eudocimus albus</i>	Around 20 seen at Los Flamencos Reserve
22	Wood Stork	<i>Mycteria americana</i>	4 flew over at Los Flamencos Reserve
23	Roseate Spoonbill	<i>Platalea ajaja</i>	Up to 12 seen at Los Flamencos Reserve
24	American Flamingo	<i>Phoenicopterus ruber</i>	Just 2 seen at Los Flamencos Reserve
25	Black-bellied Whistling-Duck	<i>Dendrocygna autumnalis</i>	Seen on 4 days with 12 along the coast
26	Torrent Duck	<i>Merganetta armata</i>	A pair were seen well on a very swollen river at Otun Quimbaya
27	Andean Teal	<i>Anas andinus</i>	8 seen on a lake at Bogota Rail site
28	White-cheeked Pintail	<i>Anas bahamensis</i>	40 seen from vehicle at Isle de Salamanca
29	Blue-winged Teal	<i>Anas discors</i>	Maximum of 20 at Bogota Rail site and up to 60 at Isle de Salamanca
30	Andean Duck	<i>Oxyura ferruginea</i>	Just 2 seen at Bogota Rail site
31	Turkey Vulture	<i>Cathartes aura</i>	Common and seen on 13 days
32	Lesser Yellow-headed Vulture	<i>Cathartes burrovianus</i>	2 seen well quartering fields near Victoria
33	Black Vulture	<i>Coragyps atratus</i>	Common and seen everyday of the tour
34	King Vulture	<i>Sarcoramphus papa</i>	1 seen overhead when driving up Santa Marta
35	Osprey	<i>Pandion haliaetus</i>	1 seen at Laguna Pedro Palo and up to 4 at Isle de Salamanca
36	Swallow-tailed Kite	<i>Elanoides forficatus</i>	6 were seen from the Galapagos Road
37	Pearl Kite	<i>Gampsonyx swainsonii</i>	1 seen by several of the group while driving back to Santa Marta
38	White-tailed Kite	<i>Elanus leucurus</i>	Seen on 2 days near Bogota
39	Savanna Hawk	<i>Buteogallus meridionalis</i>	1 seen briefly en-route to Ibague and a couple of others seen while driving towards Victoria

41	Gray Hawk	<i>Buteo nitidus</i>	1 seen well at Cueva de Condor, Rio Claro

54	Colombian Chachalaca E	<i>Ortalis garrula</i>	Endemic: 2 seen briefly at Nevados NP and heard at 3 other sites during tour
55	Band-tailed Guan	<i>Penelope argyrotis</i>	Seen on 3 days with max of 5 in Santa Marta mountains

56	Cauca Guan	E	<i>Penelope perspicax</i>	Endemic: Up to 8 seen along the road at Otun Quimbaya. An endangered species declining due to loss of specific habitat requirements
57	Wattled Guan		<i>Aburria aburri</i>	A surprise find at roadside stop when returning from Guajira. Possibly displaced by floods
58	Sickle-winged Guan		<i>Chamaepetes goudotii</i>	2 seen on Galapagos Road and 1 seen at Rio Blanco Reserve
59	Crested Bobwhite		<i>Colinus cristatus</i>	4 seen in stubbly fields at stop en-route to Ibague
60	Black-fronted Wood-Quail		<i>Odontophorus atrifrons</i>	With three very small disjunct populations two in Colombia and one in Venezuela, we enjoyed superb views of 4 birds of the nominate race in the gardens of Eldorado Lodge, Santa Marta
61	Bogota Rail	E	<i>Rallus semiplumbeus</i>	Endemic: Most visitors try and see this species in the park in Bogota! A far more reliable site such as the one we visited allowed us good views of up to 5 birds, most out in the open
62	Gray-necked Wood Rail		<i>Aramides cajanea</i>	A noisy pair heard only at Rio Claro
63	Spot-flanked Gallinule		<i>Gallinula melanops</i>	Up to 4 seen well at Bogota Rail site on first day
64	Common Moorhen		<i>Gallinula chloropus</i>	Up to 3 seen at Bogota Rail site
65	American Coot		<i>Fulica americana</i>	Seen at Parque Florida, Bogota. Interesting race <i>Colombiana</i> looks quite different from nominate
66	Wattled Jacana		<i>Jacana jacana</i>	Seen on 5 days but mostly while driving Note that birds were of the black race <i>hypomelaena</i>
67	Black-necked Stilt		<i>Himantopus mexicanus</i>	Seen on 2 days with 40+ at Isle de Salamanca
68	Black-bellied Plover		<i>Pluvialis squatarola</i>	A few seen along the coast on 2 days
69	Semipalmated Plover		<i>Charadrius semipalmatus</i>	Up to 30 seen along the coast on 2 days
70	Wilson's Plover		<i>Charadrius wilsonia</i>	Just 2 seen in lagoon at Isle de Salamanca
71	Killdeer		<i>Charadrius vociferus</i>	1 seen behind fuel station on way to Guajira
72	Collared Plover		<i>Charadrius collaris</i>	Up to 8 seen at Camarones
73	Southern Lapwing		<i>Vanellus chilensis</i>	Small numbers seen on 10 days
74	Greater Yellowlegs		<i>Tringa melanoleuca</i>	Seen on 2 days with good numbers along coast
75	Lesser Yellowlegs		<i>Tringa flavipes</i>	Seen on 2 days with good numbers along coast
76	Spotted Sandpiper		<i>Actitis macularius</i>	Singles seen on 4 days
77	Solitary Sandpiper		<i>Tringa solitaria</i>	1 found by Andy on lagoon at Isle de Salamanca
78	Willet		<i>Tringa semipalmata</i>	Up to 40 seen along coast on 2 days
79	Least Sandpiper		<i>Calidris minutilla</i>	Up to 20 seen along coast Camarones
80	Semipalmated Sandpiper		<i>Calidris pusilla</i>	A few seen at Isle de Salamanca
81	Stilt Sandpiper		<i>Calidris himantopus</i>	1 seen close on lagoon at Camarones
82	Whimbrel		<i>Numenius phaeopus</i>	Seen on 2 days with max of 10 on coast
83	Ruddy Turnstone		<i>Arenaria interpres</i>	Just 1 individuals seen along the coast
84	Parasitic Jaeger		<i>Stercorarius parasiticus</i>	2 adults seen long way off shore and 2 nd calendar year bird seen close chasing terns over beach at Los Flamencos – rare for Colombia!
85	Laughing Gull		<i>Leucophaeus atricilla</i>	Seen on 2 days along coast inc Los Flamencos
86	Gull-billed Tern		<i>Gelochelidon nilotica</i>	Up to 10 hawking over pool on Isle de Salamanca
87	Caspian Tern		<i>Hydroprogne caspia</i>	Amazing 700 seen at roost site at Isle de Salamanca
88	Royal Tern		<i>Thalasseus maximus</i>	Up to 60 seen on 2 days on coast and Los Flamencos

89	Cabot's Tern	<i>Thalasseus acuflavides</i>	Split from Sandwich Tern by some authorities we saw up to 60 around Los Flamencos
90	Large-billed Tern	<i>Phaetusa simplex</i>	1 seen at Isle de Salamanca while in traffic jam
91	Least Tern	<i>Sternula antillarum</i>	1 seen flying away over lagoon on Isle de Salamanca
92	Black Skimmer	<i>Rynchops nigra</i>	About 6 were seen at Los Flamencos Reserve
93	Rock Pigeon	<i>Columba livia</i>	Seen throughout tour
94	Band-tailed Pigeon	<i>Patagioenas fasciata</i>	Seen on 8 days – flocks up to 30 at Santa Marta
95	Bare-eyed Pigeon	<i>Patagioenas corensis</i>	Seen on coast on 2 days. Best Isle de Salamanca
96	Pale-vented Pigeon	<i>Patagioenas cayennensis</i>	Only heard at Rio Claro
97	Eared Dove	<i>Zenaida auriculata</i>	Common and seen on 7 days
98	Common Ground-Dove	<i>Columbina passerina</i>	Seen on up to 20 on 2 days with most on coast
99	Ruddy Ground-Dove	<i>Columbina talpacoti</i>	Seen at various sites on 8 days
100	Scaled Dove	<i>Columbina squammata</i>	Seen 2 days on coast around Guajira
101	Tolima Dove E	<i>Leptotila conoveri</i>	1 heard very close but impossible to see in Nevados NP near Ibaguè
102	White-tipped Dove	<i>Leptotila verreauxi</i>	Seen on 3 days
103	Lined Quail-Dove	<i>Geotrygon linearis</i>	1 in front of first vehicle as we drove into Santa Marta mountains
104	Scarlet-fronted Parakeet	<i>Aratinga wagleri</i>	A noisy flock of 15 seen flying over at Victoria
105	Brown-throated Parakeet	<i>Aratinga pertinax</i>	Up to 12 seen on 2 days along the coast of Santa Marta
106	Golden-plumed Parakeet	<i>Leptosittaca branickii</i>	Excellent flight views low overhead of 15 birds near Manizales
107	Yellow-eared Parrot	<i>Ognorhynchus icterotis</i>	A critically endangered species that is very rare and local. We saw a couple of groups in flight high up at Jardin
108	Spectacled Parrotlet	<i>Forpus conspicillatus</i>	Max of 4 seen on 3 days at various sites
109	Orange-chinned Parakeet	<i>Brotogeris jugularis</i>	Up to 8 in the Rio Claro area, plus Santa Marta
110	Rusty-faced Parrot	<i>Hapalopsittaca amazonina</i>	A few of this endangered species seen flying around at Rio Blanco
111	Blue-headed Parrot	<i>Pionus menstruus</i>	Seen on 5 days at various sites with max of 6
112	Red-billed Parrot	<i>Pionus sordidus</i>	Poor fly over views on 2 days at Santa Marta
113	Scaly-naped Amazon	<i>Amazona mercenaria</i>	4 seen very well feeding in trees just higher than Minca in Santa Marta
114	Yellow-crowned parrot	<i>Amazona ochrocephala</i>	4 or more seen on stop before reaching Victoria
115	Squirrel Cuckoo	<i>Piaya cayana</i>	Seen on 7 days
116	Striped Cuckoo	<i>Tapera</i>	Just one heard calling at Camarones
117	Smooth-billed Ani	<i>Crotophaga ani</i>	Common and seen many times on 10 days
118	Groove-billed Ani	<i>Crotophaga sulcirostris</i>	Plenty seen in lowlands around Santa Marta
119	Mottled Owl	<i>Ciccaba virgata</i>	1 found on Galapagos Rd where it was being mobbed by a group of small birds
120	Rufous-banded Owl	<i>Ciccaba albitarsus</i>	1 Heard far away on night trip to Rio Blanco
121	Black-and-white Owl	<i>Ciccaba huhula</i>	1 seen by last vehicle roosting in Bamboo while driving up to lodge in Santa Marta
122	White-throated Screech-Owl	<i>Megascops albogularis</i>	Heard very close in evening at Rio Blanco, but would not show
123	Santa Marta Screech-Owl	<i>Megascops gilesi</i>	Endemic: We heard 1 bird calling very early in

	E		the morning at Santa Marta, but try as we may we could not get close enough to see it.
124	Andean Pygmy-Owl	<i>Glaucidium jardinii</i>	1 seen very well in hills above Bogota
125	Ferruginous Pygmy-Owl	<i>Glaucidium brasilianum</i>	Seen on 2 days in coastal scrub near Guajira
126	Oilbird	<i>Steatornis caripensis</i>	Up to 12 seen in Cave near to Rio Claro
127	Common Potoo	<i>Nyctibius griseus</i>	A single bird on a dead tree top during the day surprised us all when it revealed that it was sat on a tiny chick, near Manizales
128	Lesser Nighthawk	<i>Chordeiles acutipennis</i>	Just 1 seen during the day on roost in Cauca Valley
129	Band-winged Nightjar	<i>Caprimulgus longirostris</i>	1 found dead and another flew up in front of vehicle while driving high up in Santa Marta
130	White-tailed Nightjar	<i>Caprimulgus cayennensis</i>	One seen very briefly at dawn while most people still in bus at Los Flamencos amongst leaf litter on the coast
131	White-collared Swift	<i>Streptoprocne zonaris</i>	Seen on 7 days with biggest flock of 200 Jardin
132	Chestnut-collared Swift	<i>Cypseloides rutilus</i>	Several seen in very good light on 2 days
133	Gray-rumped Swift	<i>Chaetura cinereiventris</i>	1 flew very close at Galapagos Rd
134	Lesser Swallow-tailed Swift	<i>Panyptila cayennensis</i>	1 seen well visiting a nest on small building in Rio Claro
135	Short-tailed Swift	<i>Chaetura brachyura</i>	Nice close flock of about 15 birds seen well in park above Victoria
136	White-tipped Swift	<i>Aeronautes montivagus</i>	A few seen well at Nevados NP near Ibague
137	Green Hermit	<i>Phaethornis guy</i>	Seen on 3 days with 2 birds at hummingbird garden near Bogota
138	Tawny-bellied Hermit	<i>Phaethornis syrmatorphorus</i>	Just one briefly on the Galapagos Road
139	Stripe-throated Hermit	<i>Phaethornis striigularis</i>	Seen on 2 days in Santa Marta area
140	Sooty-capped Hermit	<i>Phaethornis augusti</i>	One hovered over flowers beside road in Santa Marta, where I directed people to look at its under tail, but not sure if anyone remembers this bird?
141	Green-fronted Lancebill	<i>Doryfera ludovicae</i>	1 seen perched near to nest on small building on Galapagos Road
142	Lazuline Sabrewing	<i>Campylopterus falcatus</i>	A male showed well perched in the shade by feeders at Eldorado Lodge, Santa Marta
143	White-necked Jacobin	<i>Florisuga mellivora</i>	Seen on 2 days with best male perched on pole at hummingbird garden near Bogota
144	Brown Violetear	<i>Colibri delphinae</i>	1 seen on feeders near cabins at Eldorado Lodge, Santa Marta
145	Green Violet-ear	<i>Colibri thalassinus</i>	A few seen on 7 days throughout the tour
146	Sparkling Violetear	<i>Colibri coruscans</i>	A few seen on 5 days throughout the tour
147	Black-throated Mango	<i>Anthracothorax nigricollis</i>	Seen on 4 days with max of 30 at hummingbird garden near Bogota
148	Ruby Topaz	<i>Chrysolampis mosquitus</i>	Beautiful male and possibly 2 seen in scrub at Camarones
149	Red-billed Emerald	<i>Chlorostilbon gibsoni</i>	Up to 8 seen around Guajira, a near endemic
150	Blue-tailed Emerald	<i>Chlorostilbon mellisugus</i>	Seen on 4 days with best views at Navados NP, near Ibague

151	Coppery Emerald	<i>Chlorostilbon russatus</i>	1 seen well on road down from Santa Marta, a near endemic
152	Violet-crowned Woodnymph	<i>Thalurania colombica</i>	Seen on 6 days with most in Santa Marta
153	Green-crowned Woodnymph	<i>Thaluranta fannyi</i>	Just 1 seen near Galapagos Road
154	Sapphire-throated Hummingbird	<i>Lepidopuga coeruleogularis</i>	1 seen well in scrubby area at Isle de Salamanca
155	Buffy Hummingbird	<i>Leucippus fallax</i>	A very good year with 8 seen well around Los Flamencos scrub. Subspecies <i>cervina</i>
156	Indigo-capped Hummingbird E	<i>Amazilia cyanifrons</i>	Endemic: Amazing the commonest hummer at gardens near Bogota with estimated 100 individuals
157	Andean Emerald	<i>Amazilia franciae</i>	3 seen at different sites throughout tour
158	Steely-vented Hummingbird	<i>Amazilia saucerrottei</i>	Small numbers seen on 6 days throughout tour
159	Rufous-tailed Hummingbird	<i>Amazilia tzacatl</i>	Seen on 7 days with max of 50 at hummingbird garden near Bogota
160	Blossomcrown E	<i>Anthocephala floriceps</i>	Endemic: A stunning male of this much wanted hummer performed well for us on flowers in the Santa Marta mountains
161	White-vented Plumeleteer	<i>Chalybura buffonii</i>	Seen on 2 days with max 20 at hummingbird garden near Bogota
162	Speckled Hummingbird	<i>Adelomyia melanogenys</i>	Seen on 5 days and common at Rio Blanco
163	Fawn-breasted Brilliant	<i>Heliodoxa rubinoides</i>	Seen on 2 days with singles at Rio Blanco and Manizales
164	Empress Brilliant	<i>Heliodoxa imperatrix</i>	Individuals seen on just 2 days. Near endemic
165	White-tailed Hillstar	<i>Urochroa bougueri</i>	2 seen on Choco slope of the Galapagos Road
166	Mountain Velvetbreast	<i>Lafresnaya lafresnayi</i>	Only one bird seen as we returned downhill from ridge at Jardin
167	Sword-billed Hummingbird	<i>Ensifera ensifera</i>	A male perched for a few of the group near mixed flock way down from Jardin
168	Great Sapphirewing	<i>Pterophanes cyanopterus</i>	1 seen in hills above Bogota
169	Bronzy Inca	<i>Coeligena coeligena</i>	Singles seen on 3 days with good close views
170	Brown Inca	<i>Coeligena wilsoni</i>	Singles seen on just 2 days. Near endemic
171	Black Inca E	<i>Coeligena prunellei</i>	Endemic: 1 males seen very well on road to Laguna Pedro Palo
172	Collared Inca	<i>Coeligena torquata</i>	Small numbers seen well on 4 days
173	White-tailed Starfrontlet E	<i>Coeligena phalerata</i>	Endemic: Seen on 3 days in the Santa Marta mountains with superb views of male in lodge gardens
174	Buff-tailed Coronet	<i>Boissonneaua flavescens</i>	Seen on 4 days with max 60 at Rio Blanco
175	Velvet-purple Coronet	<i>Boissonneaua jardini</i>	Seen on 2 days with 4 at Galapagos Road
176	Tourmaline Sunangel	<i>Heliangelus exortis</i>	Seen on 3 days in small numbers
177	Glowing Puffleg	<i>Eriocnemis vestita</i>	\$ seen on 1 day in the hills above Bogota
178	Coppery-bellied Puffleg	<i>Eriocnemis cupreovertris</i>	Very local in Colombia and Venezuela just one seen briefly in hills above Bogota
179	Greenish Puffleg	<i>Haplophaedia aureliae</i>	Seen on 2 days, pretty easy on Galapagos Road
180	Booted Racket-tail (Racket-tailed Puffleg)	<i>Ocreatus underwoodii</i>	Note alternative names. 2 seen, 1 at Laguna Pedro Palo and another at Otun Quimbaya

181	Tyrian Metaltail	<i>Metallura tyrianthina</i>	Seen on 2 days with most of <i>districta</i> race in Santa Marta
182	Bronze-tailed Thornbill	<i>Chalcostigma heteropogon</i>	Good bird with 1 adult and 2 immatures seen well in hills above Bogota
183	Long-tailed Sylph	<i>Agelaiocercus kingi</i>	Individuals seen on 3 days with a cracker in Nevados NP, near Ibague
184	Violet-tailed Sylph	<i>Agelaiocercus coelestis</i>	Seen on 2 days around Galapagos Road
185	Wedge-billed Hummingbird	<i>Schistes geoffroyi</i>	1 seen at Nevados NP, near Ibague and another on the Galapagos Road
186	Purple-crowned Fairy	<i>Heliothryx barroti</i>	Seen on 2 days with 2 near Oilbird cave
187	Long-billed Starthroat	<i>Heliomaster longirostris</i>	1 was seen on flowering shrub
188	Purple-throated Woodstar	<i>Calliphlox mitchellii</i>	1 seen briefly on the Galapagos Road
189	White-bellied Woodstar	<i>Chaetocercus mulsant</i>	Seen on 3 days with up to 6 at hummingbird garden near Bogota
